FROM THE MANAGING TRUSTEE'S DESK



It is truly incredible to contemplate the remarkable journey we have embarked on over the past 23 years. From the very outset, our mission has remained crystal clear: to stand in solidarity with the most marginalized communities that find themselves pushed to the fringes of society due to the challenges posed by their unique geographical locations or distinct identities and abilities.

In the year 1999, I took a step away from my role at Oxfam and commenced this transformative journey - beginning in Kutch, where the challenges are as expansive as its deserts. In the Rapar Block of Kutch, water was a scarce resource, groundwater remained elusive, and the prospect of any sustainable livelihood seemed remote. Families in the region found themselves ensnared in a cycle of exploitation and poverty, with dire repercussions on the health of women and the education of children.

Since those early days, we have traversed a considerable distance. We now possess demographic and geo-hydrological data that serves as the compass for our long-term interventions in each community. Today, we have the capability to preserve and enhance surface water resources, and we are well on our way to establishing water structures that ensures water security in villages, and provide protective irrigation facilities that the communities themselves oversee and govern.

Similarly, Chhattisgarh faces its own geographical challenges. Since 2007, we have been dedicated to the restoration of land and natural resources, all the while fostering the active involvement of tribal farmers and other pivotal community stakeholders. Our aspiration is to realize 'Four Returns': those that are Inspirational, Social, Natural, and Financial, all of which are pivotal for the indigenous communities, especially Baigas that are one of the Particularly Vulnerable Tribal Groups (PVTGs). By leveraging a range of entitlements and government programs, our primary focus is on augmenting the income of farmers and tribal communities through the promotion of agriculture and forest-based livelihoods. Integral to this approach is the collaboration with government departments to guarantee the effective execution of schemes and the timely delivery of benefits to the specified communities.

In education, our engagement revolves around the Learning and Migration Program (LAMP), an initiative focused on the education of children affected by distressed seasonal migration in six districts.

In light of the communal strife that unfolded in Ahmedabad in 2002, we gained a profound awareness of the paucity of early childhood education resources. In response, we have introduced child-friendly pedagogical approaches within the public school system and incorporated cutting-edge technology, such as tablets in libraries. These initiatives have yielded tangible improvements in the academic performance and retention rates of over 4,000 children. Furthermore, we have established a daycare and rehabilitation center for both children and adults living with disabilities, providing therapies aimed at enhancing communication and mobility skills.

Throughout this year, our central emphasis has been: strengthening our team's capacity, fostering career growth opportunities, and promoting emotional resilience. Samerth has experienced significant growth over the years, with a substantial portion of this expansion occurring organically. As we step into the year 2023-2024, we are committed to approaching the next phase of our journey with a strategic mindset.

Our journey is marked by the fostering of partnerships with the community, with the overarching aim of creating an eco-system in which unreached communities not only survive but thrive, where landscapes flourish, and where hope and prosperity are in abundance.

MAIN ACHIEVEMENTS SINCE WE BEGAN

- Samerth has enabled the **establishment of 1,178 community-based organizations and institutions** which have a **combined membership of around 14,448** serving a **population of 2 million people** - these include Self-Help Groups, Children's Groups, Farmer Producer Groups and Farmers' Producer Organizations, Parent Associations etc. which are comprised of community members and their leaders. We have also promoted a range of community institutions to deal with various aspects of rural development such as drinking water and sanitation, agriculture, water resource development and management, livestock management, village development, savings and loans, etc.
- **We integrate technology throughout our programs**, from grassroots level to the highest levels of our work; from Geo-mapping technology, enabling hydrogeology analysis and models to initiate the development of water structures, to harnessing surface and rainwater resources... to tablet libraries and learning centers.
- Through **collaborations with the Government** and other non government agencies, **ensuring the facilitation of financial schemes and knowledge for wider reach and impact.**

- Numerous initiatives, including running 16 early education centres in remote locations; education centres reaching out to more than 3,000 children in communities and schools; Tablet libraries bridging the digital divide to more than 430 children; a centre providing need based rehabilitative services to 450 children with mental & intellectual disabilities undertaken.
- Mobile Libraries at 52 schools, Peace Education at 42 schools and leadership training for more than 1,500 adolescent girls and young women, have made a significant impact on communities in need. Additionally, over 100 women have been empowered as Nutri- Entrepreneurs, producing nutritious snacks for their communities and the broader market.

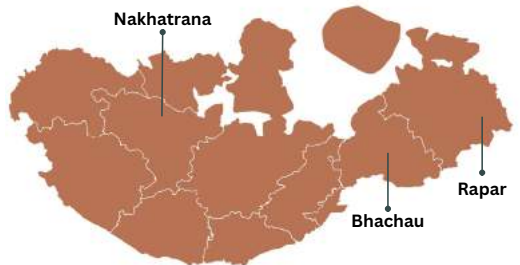

PROGRAMMES 2022-23

I. EMPOWERING THE MARGINAL FARMER COMMUNITY IN KUTCH

We began work in the Rapar Block of Kutch, Gujarat after witnessing first-hand how the harsh conditions of the arid region affect the livelihoods of the small and marginal farmer. This perpetuated exploitation and a cycle of poverty where children were kept away from schools.

Since 2001, we have been able to collect critical demographic and geo-hydrological data that has helped us develop long-term solutions to harvest surface and rainwater, mobilize a community approach to natural resource management and educate children of the community.

NURTURING CHANGE IN KUTCH

Creating a sustainable source of Nutrition for Farmers

More than 400 members from Farmer & Self Help Groups

were provided training on organic methods of farming like vermicomposting and kitchen gardens to grow a wide variety of vegetables and help families improve their own access to and intake of nutrition.

BUILDING SUSTAINABLE MEANS, CONSERVING AND MANAGING NATURAL RESOURCES

- Created 47 Ponds, 25 Rain Roof Water Harvesting Systems and two dug wells in the Kutch region helping most vulnerable communities to survive through harsh climates.
- Creating sustainable sources of drinking water for 40 gram panchayats in the Rapar region.
- Improved fodder security through grassland development of 110 acres in the region.

MUTUAL LEARNING AND INNOVATION, WORKING TOGETHER FOR WATER SAFETY!

“ During a reconnaissance visit to villages in Kutch, we visited Dholaveera, an ancient archaeological site with numerous water harvesting structures dating 4,500 years back. Gazala Ji and I saw the plight of the people, especially the marginalized communities living in isolated places in the villages. **We observed women and girls walk many kilometers to fetch fresh drinking water, as the underground water is saline and fresh-water zones are very limited.** ”

Samerth and Water Harvest came to work together to create water-self-sufficient villages. For the first-time artificial catchment water harvesting systems, usually practiced in the Thar desert of Rajasthan were piloted in the Great Rann of Kutch, Gujarat. This, along with introduction of domestic water filters and small behavioral changes - made drinking water safer for families! ”

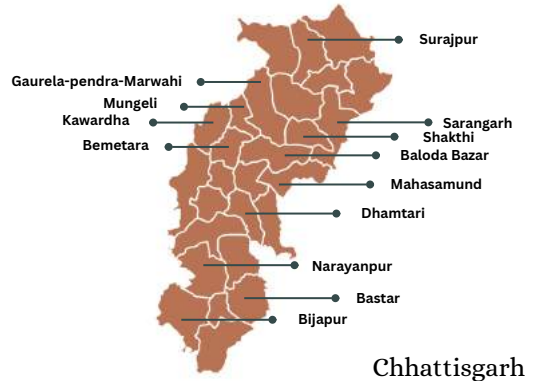

III . DEVELOPING AND DIVERSIFYING NATURAL RESOURCE BASED LIVELIHOODS AND SUPPORTING ACCESS TO QUALITY EDUCATION OF **MARGINALISED COMMUNITIES IN CHHATTISGARH**

Working with the most vulnerable groups dependent on forest produce and agriculture where the communities face great challenges with erratic rainfall and poor irrigation facilities. This region is cut off from surrounding areas due to the hilly geography, and sustainable livelihood is a great challenge to its native tribals. Since 2007, we have been working with marginal tribal farmers as well as Particularly Vulnerable Tribal Groups (PVTGs), reaching 13 districts.

IMPROVING WATER SECURITY AND NATURAL RESOURCES TO **SUPPORT SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOODS**



Improved water security by building over 4800 water structures and over 200 watersheds.



Provided support to develop sustainable fishing for over 800 families.



Developed plantations of over 70 hectares that now support close to 500 family's livelihoods.



Provided appropriate tools to mahua harvesters and fruit pickers to improve efficiencies in their livelihoods



Established over 30 piggery units that three Self Help Groups have taken over. 6 Self Help Groups provided goatary support for entrepreneurship development



Created ten agroforestry patches in the community.



Handheld over 300 tribal families to create their own nutri-kitchen gardens.



STRENGTHENING LOCAL SCHOOL SYSTEMS AND RESOURCES

The education programme provides access to quality education opportunities to children in areas of seasonal migration, while also advocating to communities and governments the universal right to education. The Learning and Migration Program (LAMP) operates in highly underserved, remote districts, where school dropout often occurs due to distress seasonal migration undertaken by the family.

- 10,337 children reached through 400 Learning Resource Centers
- 5 Smart classes were established
- 5 Science labs with appropriate tools were established
- 14 libraries were established in schools and learning centers
- 672 School Management Committee members are trained
- 1,151 Panchayati Raj Institution members were trained on the right to education in districts where school dropout often occurs due to distress seasonal migration undertaken by the family.



CONDUCTING AQUIFER MAPPING TO IMPROVE WATER RESOURCES AND **SUPPORT SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE**

We have begun aquifer mapping in the Sakri River Basin to draw out future ways forward for groundwater restoration, catchment and recharge zone development and appropriate cropping.

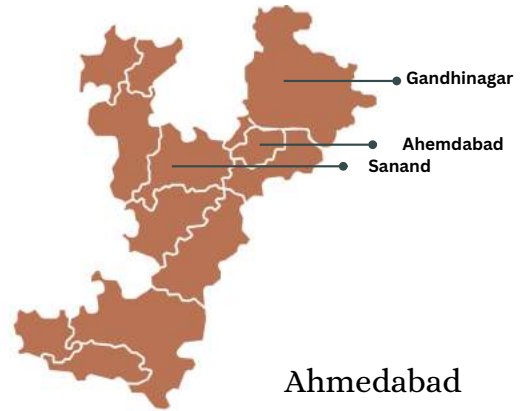
Tribal communities are also undergoing leadership training to undertake the planning and governance of water management systems.



II . ADDRESSING GAPS IN RESOURCES FOR SCHOOLS, THE DIFFERENTLY ABLED AND YOUNG WOMEN **FOR A MORE INCLUSIVE AHMEDABAD**

Samerth Talim Kendra: The need based rehabilitation centre for Differently Abled Children and Adults

- In 2007, there was a critical demand for a dedicated programme in Ahmedabad to address the **unique needs of children and adults with disabilities residing in the densely populated slums of Vejalpur, Sarkhej, and Makarba.**
- We provided **rehabilitative care, encompassing physiotherapy, speech therapy, sensory therapy, and animal-assisted therapy, to more than 100 children.** Over the course of the past year, these children have experienced significant improvements in their communication and mobility skills.



STRENGTHENING SCHOOL SYSTEMS WITH CHILD-FRIENDLY PEDAGOGIES

- Working with over **13 public schools and community centres** to adopt child-friendly pedagogies that **improve school retention and test scores of over 2,500 children.**
- Initiated the **'tablet' programme** where **400 children aged 5 to 14 years in five learning centres** are provided with handheld tablets to help them access technology and the internet to support their learning.
- Provided the **National Institute of Open Schooling (NIOS) Programme** to over 60 out-of-school children from Classes 10 and 12.



FOSTERING ENTREPRENEURSHIP AMONGST ADOLESCENT GIRLS AND **YOUNG WOMEN FOR FINANCIAL INDEPENDENCE**

We work closely with adolescent girls and women on essential skills of entrepreneurship as well as sexual health and rights, and nutrition. We believe with the right support and access to skills, entrepreneurship is an effective tool for financial independence and community development.



Training with Adolescent girls on Nutrition and Menstrual Hygiene

- Provided an intensive training programme on leadership, entrepreneurship, health and women's rights to over **500 adolescent girls and young women**.
- Supported the **establishment of nutritional snack businesses of 12 young women**. We have set up a central kitchen to support the operations of all these businesses.
- Provided alternate **vocational training** in jewelry making, and paper-plate making to **young adults with disabilities**.

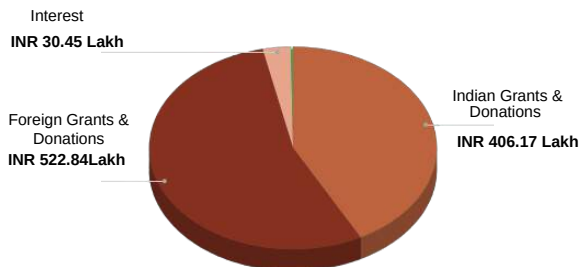

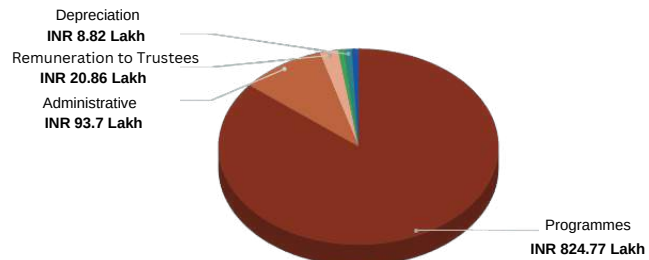

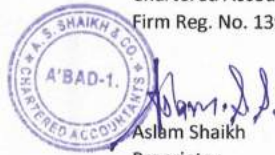
